From the Pastor's Desk

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by command of God our Savior and of Jesus Christ our hope, to Timothy, my true child in the faith: (1 Timothy

Paul was both a theologian and a missionary. For him the two were not mutually exclusive. More than any other writer in the New Testament, the Apostle Paul defined in a systematic way the high doctrines of the Christian faith- doctrines such as God's Sovereignty and salvation exclusively by grace through faith in Christ. At the same time, Paul devoted his life to the planting and development of new churches in pagan lands. He had a passion and a vision for the expansion of Christ's Kingdom. In doing so, Paul put feet to his theology.

One example of this is how we find Paul making the effort to mentor other young men in the faith. Timothy is a case in point. Here we have not one letter but two in the New Testament addressed specifically to this one young man. In fact it is almost certain that the last recorded letter written by the apostle is to Timothy, penned shortly before Paul, knowing full well what was in store for him, was executed for his faith. All this should tell us a great deal about our calling both as individual Christians and as a church.

We just finished another season of basketball. The Miami Heat beat the Oklahoma City Thunder for the championship this year. Not too many years ago, the San Antonio Spurs took the championship. For many years David Robinson was the heart of the team, not because he was a superstar in the same vein as Michael Jordan, but because of his vision to serve as a mentor to the younger members of the team, Tim Duncan in particular. Robinson is a graduate of the Naval Academy (thus his nickname, "the Admiral). He is also a Christian. It was amazing to watch how served as a father figure to the younger Duncan, and even when the championship might be on the line, set Duncan up for good shots instead of monopolizing the ball himself. For those who knew what he was doing, it spoke volumes. Robinson has been retired from basketball for a few years now, but Duncan is still playing.

I see a similar pattern in the Apostle in his ministry to Timothy and think about what it means for us here at Grace Church. I find myself thinking more and more about my age. (I'm 61 now) I don't intend to close my Bible and step away from the pulpit in the near future, but I do find myself thinking about the future of Grace Church. Where are we headed? What's God got in store for us in the coming years? Where are the young people? What are we doing with the young people? Do we ever take into consideration the fact that we will turn the keys of the church to them in a few years?

There are many times when I feel, "I've got my theology in order." "I know how to exegete the Bible." "I know how to run the church", all the while keeping the younger generation at arm's length. "Just sit down and be quiet, kids, and let us do it right." But that's not mentoring. Mentoring means that we are committed to both the spiritual welfare of the next generation today and to the welfare of the church as whole tomorrow.

Will they make mistakes? Oh gracious, yes! But then I guess I do too, even at my age. I'm awfully glad that God doesn't hold that against me. The most important thing to remember is that the welfare of the church rests in Christ's hands, both present and future, but he has given us a responsibility. The question is, will we take our responsibility seriously?

LEARNING AND ARRIVING: Knowledge Is Insight

Give instruction to a wise man, and he will be still wiser; teach a righteous man, and he will increase in learning. The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight. (Proverbs 9:9-10).

Although we have a dozen or so weeks' respite from the rigors of Sunday school instruction, we should each and all be mindful to continue in our daily study of God's word in Scripture and exposition of Scripture, commentary, hermeneutics, apologetics, and Christian literature. Among our tasks as Christians stands our obligation to use our God-given minds to cultivate Christlikeness in both heart and action. To bring this fruit to bear, we must pursue learning the knowledge God freely offers and gaining the wisdom He graciously teaches.

I will meditate on Your precepts
and fix my eyes on Your ways.

I will delight in Your statutes;
I will not forget Your word. (Psalm 119:15-16)

Over the Summer months, take the opportunity to read for the enhancement your Christian wisdom, to meditate on the word of God as revealed to us in Scripture, and to delight in the related meditations and personal revelations of Christian authors. While our classes will not be convening and our instructors (or "facilitators" as this teacher sometimes self-refers) not weekly passing on the gifts of grace in Christian reformation given by the Holy Spirit, "[i]f the Holy Spirit is our first and foremost teacher, there is a sense in which we ourselves, in our very dependence on the Spirit, must also teach ourselves." If we continue to fix our eyes on the Bible and the array of divine wisdom which has previously been revealed from the depths of the Bible's pages, we will not forget His word.

We approach our learning life in the Holy Spirit prayerfully and joyfully, as did our Savior:

In that same hour He rejoiced in the Holy Spirit and said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that You have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to little children ... (Luke 10:21a)

How many are the wise and understanding of this secular, post-modern age, who in their strife to acquire worldliness, overlook the very Godliness of the simple Gospel message by grace so clearly revealed to His children?
